Name and description of the field.

Concentrations are available in French, Spanish, and Russian Studies. Foreign language major programs provide training in the skills of understanding, speaking, reading and writing the major language. Students also develop their ability to analyze and evaluate the culture and literature of the countries where the language is spoken.

What special skills or abilities are needed to succeed in this major?

Previous experience in the major language is helpful, but not necessary. Successful foreign language students are good writers in their first language and have the desire to communicate like speakers of the major language.

If both B.A. and B.S. degrees are offered, what are the differences in career/graduate school opportunities?

Only the B.A. is available.

Is a Minor available? Yes, minors are available in Chinese, French, German, Latin, Russian, Spanish, and Classical Studies. A new minor in Japanese will be available beginning in fall 2008.

What are recent graduates doing?

Individuals are attending graduate school in foreign languages, law, education, and international studies, or working in public and private international organizations, in international business, or teaching. Many foreign language majors enter positions in which they do not use their major language directly; rather, they use the analytical and communications skills which the major helps develop. Because Spanish is no longer a foreign language in the U.S., Spanish speakers have particular opportunities in federal, state and local government retailing and service industries.
